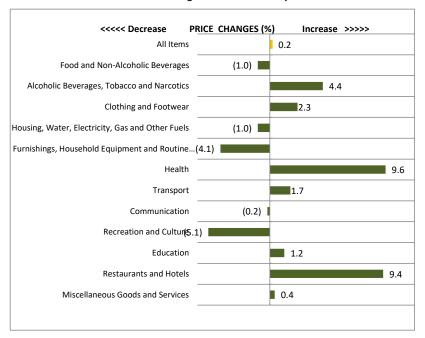

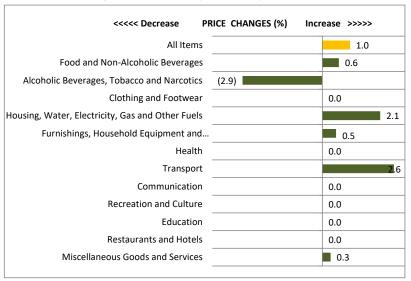

The Consumer Price Index rose by 0.2% for the twelve months ending June 2025 after declining 0.6% in May 2025. The All Items Less Food and Energy index remained unchanged over the last twelve months. The Food index declined 0.8% over the last twelve months ending June. The Energy index increased 5.4% over the last year.

The index for Food declined 0.8% after rising 0.5% in the previous month. The Food index had varied outcomes resulting from five decreases and four increases in the subcategories. The Food index was impacted by declines in the indexes for Vegetables (-4.2%), as several elementary indexes declined, including Lettuce (- 60.6%), Frozen Vegetable, California Blend (- 23.0%), Onion (-13.8%), and White Potato (-12.3%).

Other Food subcategories that contribute to decline include Fish and Seafood (-3.2%), Oils and Fats (-6.3%), Milk, Cheese, and Eggs (-2.2%), and Sugar, Jams, Honey, Chocolate, and Confectionery (-3.6%).

The index for All Items Less Food and Energy remained unchanged, resulting from offsetting results in core inflation. Four of the major groups' indexes increased in June, but were outweighed by other groups. The indexes for Health increased by 9.6% while Restaurants and Hotels rose 9.4%. Other increases were Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco and Narcotics (+4.4%), Clothing and Footwear (+2.3%). These increases were offset by decreases in the indexes for Recreation and Culture (+5.1%), Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Household Maintenance (+4.1%), Maintenance and repair of dwelling (+3.7%), and Actual Rentals for Housing 3.2%.

The Monthly Consumer Price Index for June 2025 increased by 1.0% in June 2025 after declining 0.6% in May.

The index for food rose 0.9 percent in June after falling 0.4% in May. Seven of the nine major grocery store food group indexes increased in June. The index for Food Products N.E.C. rose 3.9% over the month as both the indexes for Tomato paste and Ketchup increased 3.0% and the index for BBQ sauce increased by 5.5%. The index for Fruits increased 3.5% in June with the indexes for Fresh and Chilled Fruit; and Frozen, Preserved or Processed Fruit and Fruit-based Products increasing 3.6% and 3.1% respectively.

The Vegetables index increased 2.8% with the Fresh or Chilled Vegetables rising 4.8% after declining 1.5% the previous month.

The index for All Items less Food and Energy rose 1.1 percent in June. The index for Transport Services rose 8.4% in June. The index for Actual Rentals for Housing increased 3.0% over the month and the index for Goods and Services for routine Household Maintenance rose 1.0%. The index for Miscellaneuos Good and Services rose 0.3% over the same period.

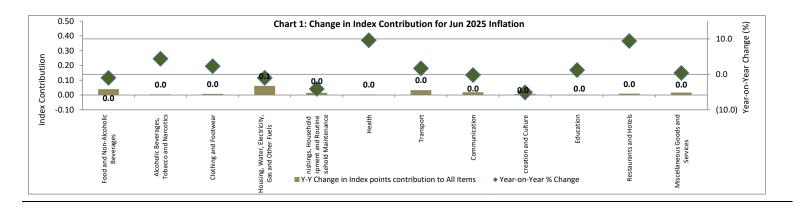

Outlets refer to the businesses where prices are collected (e.g supermarkets). The same outlets are used for Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages, Alcoholic Beverages, Tobacco & Narcotics and some Miscellaneous Goods and Services

What is the Consumer Price Index?

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a statistical indicator of changes in the general level of prices of consumer goods and services purchased by private households. The CPI measures price movements of a fixed quality and quantity of goods and services. The mix of these consumer goods and services comprising the CPI are referred to as a "shopping basket." In constructing this "shopping basket", the selected goods and services are organised first by commodity type. They are then divided into sections, then sub-groups and then assigned to a major expenditure category. The Antigua and Barbuda CPI has 26 sections, 30 sub-groups and 12 major categories.

What is the Base Period?

The base period (base year) is the time period that is used as a reference point for measuring the price change of goods and services. The base period for the Antigua and Barbuda CPI is January 2019.

The base period index is represented as 100.0. (Usually presented as 2019 = 100). So for instance, if the April 2020 CPI for chicken legs is 167.1, then it means that the price for chicken legs has gone up by 67.1% since 2019. Similarly, if the January 2020 CPI for bread is 93.1, then the price of bread has dropped by 6.9% compared to its price in 2019.

What is Inflation?

Inflation is the process of rising prices, resulting in diminishing purchasing power of a given amount of money. There are three expressions of price changes:

- year-on-year (the inflation rate)
- month-to-month
- annual average (or annualised average)

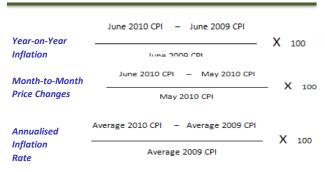
The annual average CPI is the arithmetic mean of the CPIs of the 12 months.

What are Weights?

Weights are "expenditure shares" that is the proportion of total spending on various consumer goods and services, for example, 20% on rent, 25% food, 15% transport, 10% on utilities and so on. the CPI weights are a expression of household's spending on consumer goods and services.

The weights were drawn from a survey of a sample of households in each month of 2006 (the weight base period). Each household in thesample kept a record of their expenditure for one month. Once completed, the expenditures were added to determine expenditure shares per 1000; theseare the weights.

The current weights indicate that, households would spend the most on *Accommodation* (218.3 out of 1000) followed by *Food* (214.2) and *Transportation and Communication* (153.5). Households spend the least on *Alcoholic Drink and Tobacco* (1.6).



The compilation of the CPI and the calculation of the inflation rate involve the processing of hundreds of price quotations. The Statistics Division wishes to acknowledge the cooperation of the business community in supplying the required prices and accommodating the Statistical Officers on their premises.

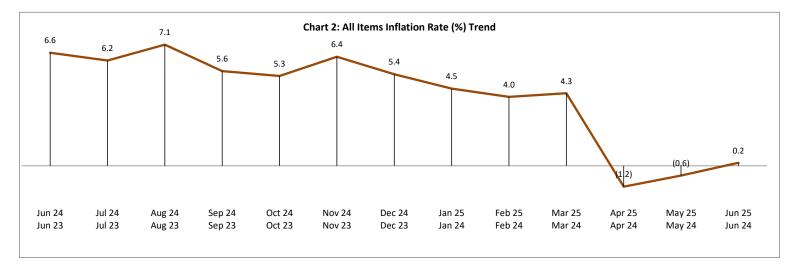

Table 3 outlines the distribution of price movements for four inflation periods:

Jun 2025 compared to Jun 2024 May 2025 compared to May 2024 Jun 2025 compared to May 2025

In Jun 2025 compared to Jun 2024, 5 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded price decreases, while 7 recorded price increases. 9 of the 23 subgroup levels also recorded price increases for some of the items that fall in that level. These collective increases and decreases would account for the magnitude and direction of the current inflation rate. 0 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded no price changes.
